Raiders Enter Week 6 With an Unfamiliar View

RACINE – The Racine Raiders come into Week 6 of the Players Football Association looking UP at other teams ahead of them in the standings for the first time since 2022. The franchise record 31-game winning streak ended on a crisp night in Detroit last Saturday, but there is little time to dwell on it. The first place Indianapolis Bison (5-0) come to Racine for the first time ever, and are looking to show everyone their intent to be **contenders**, and not **pretenders**. The Bison are one of three currently unbeaten teams in league play, sitting on top of the standings due to point differential. Also undefeated are the Detroit Ravens (5-0) - who snapped Racine's winning streak last Saturday with a 27-7 victory in Farmington Hills, MI - and the PFA defending league champion Motor City Rams (5-0).

Racine looks to rebound from its defeat and get back to winning ways. This game opens a string of five straight home games at Historic Horlick Athletic Field for the Raiders, and the Bison bring in an offense averaging 38.9 points per game. Last week the Raiders offense was held scoreless on three out of four trips into the redzone, and a similar performance would spell trouble for Racine's plans to get back on track.

Saturday's game is Alumni Night for the Raiders, as they welcome back former players, coaches, board members, and volunteers to celebrate 72 years of tradition. The three newest members of the Racine Raiders Hall of Fame will be inducted during a halftime ceremony, as well as tribute to Raiders who have departed in the past year.

The End of the Run: Raiders 31-game Winning Streak Broken)

The Racine Raiders historic 31-game winning streak finally came to an end this week in their 27-7 loss to the Detroit Ravens in Farmington Hills, Mich. This puts the Raiders at 4-1 on the season. Early on during the game it looked to be another defensive battle for the Raiders. The Ravens would pull away early and never look back, while the Raiders looked to fight their way back but would be stopped short almost every chance they got.

The Raiders offense started the game hot marching down the field but couldn't find the endzone. From there on out the Raiders offense struggled to get things going, and when they would find a groove, they would fall short of the endzone. The Raiders put up 230 yards of offense and one touchdown right before the end of the first half.

The Raiders defense struggled on the night for what seemed to be the first time in a long time. Injuries have piled up for the Raiders dominant defense and it showed during their matchup with the Ravens having allowed just over 420 yards and four touchdowns. The otherwise dominant defensive line was shut out on the night not being able to record a sack.

The Raiders opened the game fast marching their way down the field but were stopped at the goal line. As a result, Mike Peralta would attempt a field goal but would end up pushing it too far and missing.

On the following drive by the Ravens, they would march down the field and find the endzone through the air. Quarterback Torrence Webster would find receiver Almount Smith open over the middle of the field when he took it 33 yards for a touchdown. Phillip Shaver would make the extra point making it 7-0 Ravens with just over three minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The next score of the game came from the Ravens again this time just before the end of the first half. Webster would once again find an open receiver this time Quez Hall down the field for a 15-yard touchdown. Shaver would make the extra point once again making it 14-0 Ravens with just 49 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

Remembering Those We Have Lost



Peter Jackel: Racine Raiders legend Bob Milkie celebrated for drive, compassion

The pause was so extended following a question during the telephone interview that one couldn't help wonder whether the line had been disconnected.

Racine Raiders coach Wilbert Kennedy had just been asked to describe his emotions following the death Nov. 29 of Bob Milkie, whom he considered to be a second father. Milkie for years has been widely considered to be the face of the Raiders, possibly the most successful semi-professional football program in the nation, and the gravity of Kennedy's lengthy silence spoke volumes.

Kennedy had so many answers during the last two seasons while the Raiders won back-to-back Gridiron Developmental Football League championships and extended their winning streak to 27 games. But he was at a loss for words while attempting to come to terms with the passing of Milkie, who died of cancer at age 86. Just four months earlier, Kennedy was embracing Milkie during an emotional halftime ceremony at Horlick Field to celebrate Kennedy's recent 100th career victory as Raiders coach.

"I don't know ..." Kennedy finally said. "Oh, man. I feel a lot of emptiness, but I'm so fortunate I got to speak to him before he passed. I was just calling him to get caught up on daily stuff. We spoke for a while before he told me he was ill.

"We talked about it for a little bit and then he went back to being his typical self, wanting to know what was going on with me. When he passed, it was hard for me to believe."

That sentiment is being shared by countless people Milkie impacted during his life. The prevailing thought among those who knew him best is that Milkie was a sometimes hard-nosed, but always a compassionate, charitable, sentimental and decent man who helped give the Racine sports community some of its most enduring memories.

He snapped the ball to quarterback Jim May when the Raiders were routinely playing before crowds in excess of 6,000 during their back-to-back undefeated seasons of 1964 and '65. Wearing No. 51 in honor of his idol, Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame center Jim Ringo, Milkie was the centerpiece of an offensive line that protected May, who played only those two magical seasons. "He had such a positive approach to everything," May said. "He would get those linemen so pumped up to block. We all respected him so much that whatever he said was good enough for them."

May recalled a bitterly cold, snowy night on Nov. 21, 1964, when the Raiders were hosting the Elmhurst Travelers in the Central States Football League championship game at Horlick Field. The game was in a scoreless tie late in the fourth quarter when May led the Raiders to Elmhurst's 1-yard line.

"I remember one game when he instructed me on a play," May said. "It was called the 'Ice Bowl' because it was 3 degrees outside! I scored on a sneak in the fourth quarter. Before I called the play, Bob said, 'Come in off my left hip,' and we did."

Milkie's streak of 113 games played came to an end in August 1967 because of a neck injury. A concussion ended his playing career during the 1970 season, when Milkie was 32, but the best was yet to come.

In 1980, Milkie was named head coach of the Racine Gladiators, which the Raiders were known as from 1978-86. One year later, he coached the organization to the first of 11 national championships to date — a 17-10 victory over the Chambersburg (Pa.) Cardinals.

Milkie went on to coach the Raiders for three stints: 1980-81, 1986-90 and 1997-2000. He went 137-31 with national championships in 1981, '88, '89.

Two of those championships are among the most remembered sporting events in Racine's history. On Nov. 26, 1988, the Raiders held on for a 5-3 victory over the Brooklyn Mariners for the American Football Association championship in a matchup of 13-0 teams. The game was played in driving rain and what was reported to be 2-inch-deep mud and was ultimately settled by a 27-yard field goal from Steve Schonert with 7:50 to play.

And on Dec. 2, 1989, the Raiders defeated the Ottawa Bootleggers 15-13 in an emotionally-charged showdown in Ottawa, Canada.

“I was so proud and I still get tears when I think about it,” Milkie said in a 2021 interview, prior to his induction into the Racine County Sports Hall of Fame. “We not only represented the City of Racine and the state of Wisconsin, but the United States of America when we went there because they were booing us, they didn’t want to play the national anthem and we wouldn’t come out of the locker room because of that.

“The game was delayed a half-hour because of that. People ask me if I would have played (if the national anthem hadn’t been played). I say, ‘No. I would have gone home.’”

Milkie and the Raiders eventually went home. But not before grabbing the championship trophy and helping themselves to the champagne the Bootleggers left behind.

Coaching was such an integral part of Milkie’s life and he carried on for several years even while making 150-mile round trips while working for the Delta Resins Company in Chicago. Milkie once estimated he coached 2,000 players and, chances are, most remember him as a positive influence. “Bob was a man who loved Racine and he loved the Racine Raiders,” said Greg Fictum, a longtime Raiders offensive lineman. “Anything he could do to paint Racine and the Raiders in a good light, he did. He was a great ambassador wherever we played.”

Scott Smith, a former Raiders linebacker, retired as Racine Lutheran’s coach this year following three stints that began in 1995. Influenced by what he learned from Milkie, Smith led Lutheran to the WIAA Division 6 championship game in 2018.

“Bob has a great way of communicating with the players and I hope I was able to take some of that from him and use that with my players,” Smith said. “What stuck out for me was how he could remember so many players from so many different years. You knew how much those players meant to him by the way he talked about them.”

Joe Mooney, the retired general manager of the Raiders, cherishes the longtime working relationship he had with Milkie.

“He was one of the kind,” Mooney said. “He was an old-school guy who believed in old-school principles and got results with old-school principles. Nowadays, they have analytics and stuff like that. Bob knew, ‘Hike the ball and run as fast as you can.’ He knew how to coach and he surrounded himself with great coaches.”

But Milkie was even better in one aspect of his life. And that was as a husband. While working in The Journal Times’ advertising department in the late 1970s, the divorced Milkie became acquainted with another staff member named Evie, who was also divorced. They were married on April 12, 1980, and Milkie gave Evie more than 44 years of memories she will always cherish.

This same tough coach was also a softie who would routinely leave Evie mushy little notes or use his skills as a craftsman to make her little nick-nacks. One time, he made a miniature snowman that he placed outside on their porch.

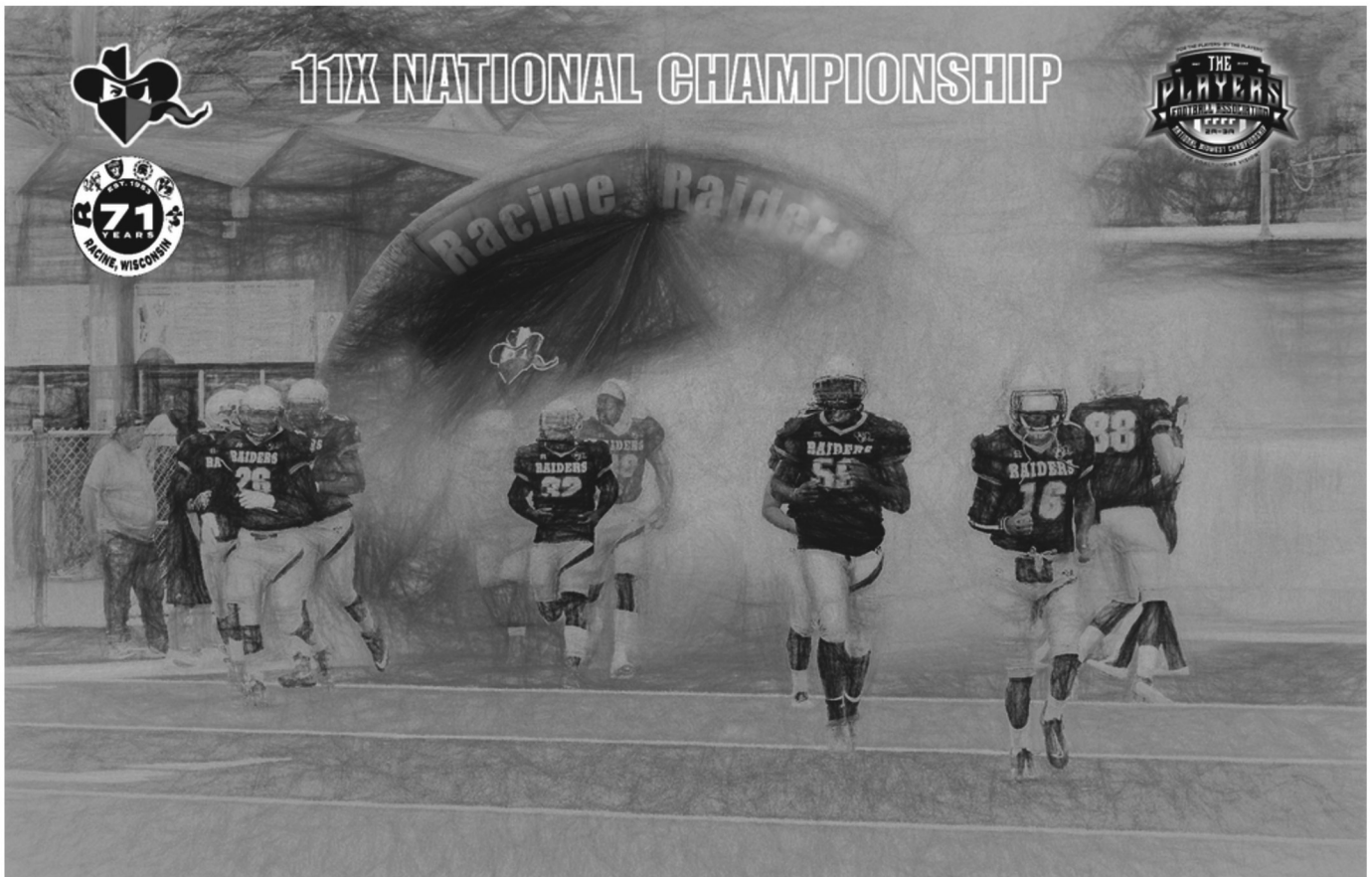
“From time to time, I would travel with my sisters and he was known to stick little notes in my luggage or tuck extra cash in my purse somewhere,” Evie said. “He did a lot of kind things.

“I remember when the first snowfall came one year, he made this little tiny snowman that he set on our deck railing. And he had a little scarf on him and a little hat and it looked like this little snowman was singing. His head was kind of raised and he had this little black mouth.

“When I looked out and saw this cute little thing, I thought, ‘Holy smokes! It looks like that guy is singing out there!’ He just had a sense of humor about things. He was very artistic.”

That little snowman eventually melted away. But the man who created him is going to endure for so much longer.

“He only had two boys by blood, but he felt he had generations of sons through his involvement with football,” Evie said. “It’s just amazing. He felt he got a lot from his mentors, so he wanted to pay it back.”



David “Dave” Poisl (Captain 1969) Racine Raider Hall of Fame 2005



On Dec. 14th, 2024, David “Dave” Poisl, 84 of Paris, WI departed his earthly life, surrounded by his girls, Linda, Nancy, and Jill who will miss him immensely.

Born on April 17, 1940, the fifth of William and Della (Williams) Poisl’s seven children. He enjoyed a classic youth working and playing hard on the family dairy farm. Dave enjoyed sports, most notably, football. At Central High School, he became captain of the football team, class vice president, homecoming king, and prom king before graduating. At U.W. Whitewater he continued to play football while enjoying general tomfoolery with his fraternity, Sigma Tau Gamma.

In 1963, after graduating from U.W. Whitewater and training in the National Guard, Dave became a science teacher for Racine Unified School District where he taught for 36 years (6 at Jerstad Jr. High and 30 at Case High School). Dave was never afraid to stand up for what he believed in. He proved this when he was jailed for teachers’ rights twice in 1977 while on strike with the teachers union.

Besides teaching and being “Dad”, Dave wasn’t done with football yet. He played for the Racine Raiders for 8 years, became defensive captain in 1969, and was inducted into the Racine Raiders Hall of Fame in 2005.

Pete Madden, DB, #20 - Racine Raider Hall of Famer

Pete Madden, admitted to the Hall of Fame in 2007, of Porterfield, Wisconsin, passed away at the age of 83 in December 2024. His family recently gave him a send-off and celebration of his life worthy of a Vietnam Veteran and Racine Raider, sharing hundreds of photos and stories. Pete played in the Raiders as #20, as a safety and wide receiver, and was proud of his time there and the friends he made. His family will miss him, but his memory lives on.

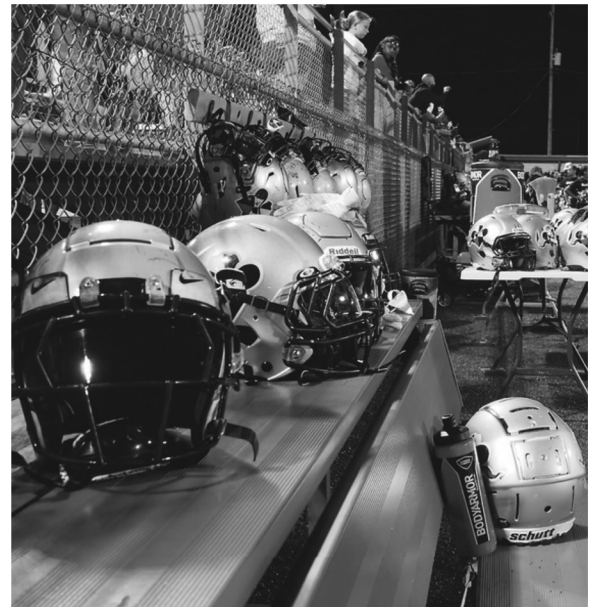
