WELCOME TO NATIONAL FOOTBALL

Welcome back to football on a national level! The MidStates Football League disbanded following the 2022 season and the Raiders searched far-and-wide to find a league that best suited for the organization's goal of claiming the truest national championship that exists at our level of football. After contacting over a dozen leagues and interviewing the leadership of three leagues, the board of directors decided that the Gridiron Developmental Football League was the best option.

There are challenges as the Raiders took the lead to try and build a division in the Upper Midwest, a process that the board of directors knew would take a couple of years as teams watched how we navigated some of the challenges. The biggest of those challenges in today's world is the cost of travel. As the Upper Midwest division grows, that will become less of a burden but this year, there will be travel to St. Paul, Indianapolis, and Cincinnati and that's just during the season. The playoffs could result in travel to New York, Tennessee, or a multitude of areas East of the Mississippi River. Ultimately, the organization hopes we travel to Atlanta, the site of the 2023 GDFL national championship game.

The Road to Atlanta starts tonight as there is no preseason for the 2023 Racine Raiders. Our first three games are against GDFL opponents in the Baltimore Lightning, Cap City Seahawks (May 20), and St. Paul Pioneers (June 3). Due to only having four actual GDFL games this year, other games will count in the league standings despite not being against league opponents. This was something the Raiders, Pioneers, and the GDFL agreed to throughout the process as the leadership from all of the organizations understood the challenge of putting together a full division in such a widespread league.

We thank you for joining us on this ground-breaking ride and we hope our 70th season ends with members of our organization hoisting our 10th national championship trophy in Atlanta.



PLAYER PROFILE: CHANNING SCHULTZ

Defensive back Channing Schultz enters his seventh season with the Racine Raiders and is coming off of a 2022 campaign where he had a career-high with six interceptions.

Head coach Wilbert Kennedy invited Schultz to a practice and he was hooked on the organization.

"The way everybody came to practice, the trainers, the staff, and me being from Racine and growing up always hearing about the Racine Raiders, it was an obvious choice," said Schultz.

Schultz also appreciates the family atmosphere that the Racine Raiders organization supports.

"The most important thing to me is the way the Raiders let my son be so involved," said Schultz. "I know (my son) is going to remember these days and in his eyes the Raiders are like a professional team."

Schultz played high school football for Case High School under former Raiders player and coach Gregg Brenner. It was then that he was given the nickname "Chan Island" as a sophomore cornerback playing on the varsity team.

"I had some of my best games at corner and I believe to play that position you've got to be very confident in yourself but not cocky," said Schultz.

Schultz gave us a little insight into what it's like to be on Chan Island.

"If I'm Chan Island, I'm locked in and I take it personal," said Schultz. "It's not a friendly place. There's a lot of



talking, a lot of me letting you know you won't catch a ball."

Schultz said he was nervous about the move to the Gridiron Developmental Football League at first but that has now turned to excitement and he feels he's ready to have the best season of his career.

"I'm at my heaviest weight; I've been in the weight room like crazy; I'm at my strongest," said Schultz. "This year just feels different with talent, more competition in practice, people are fighting for positions, and I feel like this is the best shape I've been in since I've been playing with the Raiders."






